### **What's a Potcake?????**

This is from Alison Barrick:

"I was very excited to attend my first AKC Star Puppy Class at Cool Critters. All the attendees stood around in a circle while Ileana asked them to name the breed of their dog. When it came to me, I said "I have a Potcake." "What's a Potcake?" asked Ileana, having never heard of such a breed. I told her that Potcake is the name given to the numerous stray dogs that roam the islands of the Bahamas and the Turks and Caicos. The name developed because locals give them the caked remains in the bottom of the pot to eat.

I never expected to adopt a puppy from a foreign country, but then again, I am Canadian, so perhaps it is appropriate. In early 2008, I read an article in the Tampa Tribune about the plight of Potcake dogs and something clicked. My husband Frank and I had been considering a dog for several years, but after much research into various breeds, we had still not reached a decision on the right dog for us. Once I visited the Potcake Place website and saw the adorable puppies, I

was hooked. Potcakes seemed to be the perfect type of dog for us - not too big, not too small, not purebred with inherent health issues, nor a stray where you know nothing about the parents. Although Potcakes are strays, they all seem to have the same body type and personality.

I began to eagerly scour the pages of the website, looking at all the photos of pups available for adoption. Testimonials sprinkle the site, exclaiming the wonders of these remarkable dogs. People from all over North America have adopted pups and proclaim them to be the smartest, most affectionate and happy dogs they have ever seen. The average size of a Potcake is between 40-55 lbs. They have an ordinary "dog" look about them with short ears that flop, short coats, sleek bodies, long legs and skinny tails that curl upwards. They also have what is called a "Potcake smile" that is indicative of their happy-go-lucky nature.

I nervously contacted Potcake Place to fill out an application. I spoke on the phone with the director Jane Parker-Rauw, a lovely woman who speaks enthusiastically about these wonderful dogs. She assured me that if I were not able to travel to her home base in Providenciales in the Turks and Caicos, they would find someone willing to bring a puppy with them on a flight into Tampa. Potcake Place relies on the kindness of travelers to airlift puppies back to the mainland in small carriers that fit under an airplane seat.

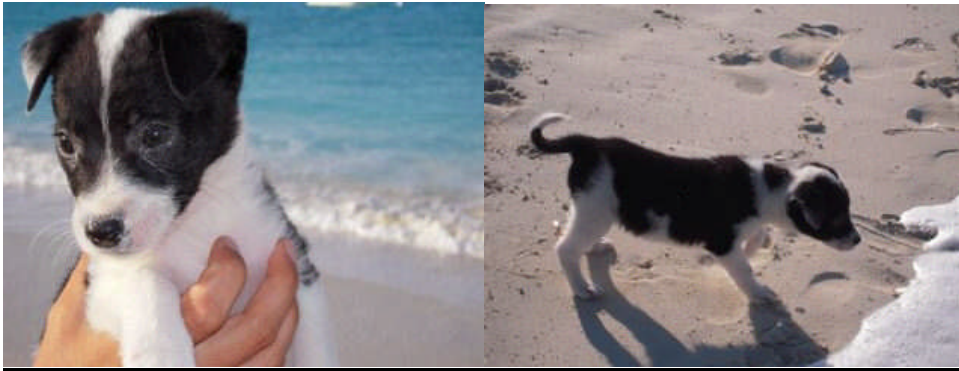
From the website, I selected a tiny black and white puppy named Princess from a new litter of 9 puppies that had just arrived from South Caicos. She was the cutest thing I had ever seen! Now I just had to be patient and wait until some kind soul brought her to Tampa. I waited and waited, and still no word on a courier. Finally, I arranged to pick up my new pup on Valentine's Day 2009 in Miami.

When I met the courier in the Miami airport and opened the travel carrier, I was surprised to pull out a puppy that was much bigger than I expected. Jane had told me that these pups have growth spurts and so it was important to get my puppy soon in order to meet airline regulations for onboard travel. By the time Katy reached me, she was close to 14 pounds, a far cry from the little five pound dog I saw on the website! However, Katy was a well-adjusted puppy and she immediately won us over with her sweet temperament.

Katy Kumquat (named after a character from the Kumquat Festival in Dade City) is now six months old, almost 30 pounds and the most enthusiastic dog I have ever met. She just finished the AKC Star Puppy Class and will now begin Basic Obedience training. I have high hopes for Katy. She is smart, fast, and loves to jump and run. I hope she will be a good agility dog. In the meantime, she is a normal puppy, constantly chewing, running, playing, chasing the cat, and doing all the other things that puppies do. She is a wonderful dog and we have never regretted our decision to adopt this new member of our family.

If I throw a dog at you when running to another ring, just feed it and praise it.

"What did it cost me" is not a good thing to say if I ask you if you like our new Ez-Up.

I have lots of good friends that I see every weekend at trials. When you meet them, just say "Hi... because I probably don't know their names.

If we have a lousy run, please don't tell me it's just a game. IT IS NOT- this is serious business. We're out to qualify AND place.

If I have a great run, hugs and kisses are in order for me and the dogs...for it is a wonderful game we play!!!

Please do not roll your eyes when my tent neighbors and I giggle and act silly- even when the tears are running down our faces and it's the umpteenth time you witnessed it. It's a stress-reliever that we learned at a seminar.

I will not be happy if you go to the [rest](#) room and missed my run. "There were five people in front of you" is not a good answer.

I will not be very happy if you tell me about the gorgeous run you saw in the next ring and I see a 25 year old walking out with spandex shorts and a BC.

Please do not expect me to make dinner [or pick up](#) when we get home. I would love to go out and have a [drink](#)- but I have to be in bed by seven.

### **Natural Bug Repellent**
